

# Owning the immaterial: art, technology and culture

An afternoon symposium which brings together a group of international speakers to consider the subject of ownership in the internet age, taking the work of artists Aleksandra Domanovic and Simon Denny as a starting point for discussion.

Curators, artists, journalists and academics will address a wide range of issues including the tension between material and immaterial values; ownership, property and theft in the age of the internet; and the shift of power from the establishment to the individual through digital media.

The event is part of the public programme for firstsite's current exhibitions *Simon Denny: The Personal Effects of Kim Dotcom* and *Aleksandra Domanović* (22 March – 1 June 2014).

He is interested in our post-privacy era, secret surveillance systems and the aesthetic produced by the merging of virtual and physical worlds. Today, he will address the question: how can we make the ubiquitous invisible network of technology visible?

The increasing number of immaterial artefacts which tell important stories about a particular era or culture presents a major challenge to national museums. **James Bridle** is a writer, artist, publisher and technologist based in London. His work covers the intersection of literature, culture and the network. He has written for Wired, ICON, Domus, Cabinet and writes a column for the Observer newspaper on publishing and technology. His work, such as the *Iraq War Historiography, an encyclopedia of Wikipedia Changelogs*, has been exhibited at galleries in the Europe, North and South America, Asia and Australia. In 2012 he lectured as part of the 4 Thought series on BBC Radio 4, contributed to the Istanbul Design Biennial and Guimaraes 2012 European City of Culture, and was adjunct professor on the Interactive Telecommunications Programme at New York University.

**Simon Denny** is a Berlin based artist interested in the structures and interfaces that influence the way we communicate. In recent projects he has explored the culture of internet-technology firms, corporate culture, obsolete analogue technology and public access to data. He plays with the conventions and perceived constraints of the gallery context using found objects, graphics, moving images and replicas. He has had solo exhibitions at MUMOK, Vienna; Kunstverein Munich; Aspen Art Museum, Colorado; Westfälischer Kunstverein, Münster; Neuer Aachener Kunstverein, Aachen; Contemporary Art Museum St.Louis, Missouri; Halle für Kunst, Lüneberg and Artspace, Sydney. He is representing New Zealand at the 56<sup>th</sup> Venice Biennale in 2015.

**Aleksandra Domanović** is an artist from Slovenia now based in Berlin. Working primarily with video, digital media and sculpture, her work is a reflection on the way that images, information and music are circulated and received at particular political and cultural moments. Associative connections are made between copyright laws, web domains and techno music. She has held solo exhibitions at Kunsthalle Basel; SPACE, London; Künstlerhaus Bethanien, Berlin; Villa du Parc – Centre d'art contemporain, Annemasse; Galerija 001, Ljubljana and Western Front, Vancouver. Her work has featured in major survey exhibitions, including the 12th Biennale of Lyon; 7th Triennial of Contemporary Art in Slovenia, Ljubljana; ICP Triennial, New York; the 1st Kyiv Biennale and 4th Marrakech Biennale. She delivered a major new commission for Glasgow International at the Gallery of Modern Art in April this year and is represented by Tanya Leighton.

**Mark Fisher** has established a reputation as one of the most insightful and provocative cultural theorists in Britain. A co-founder of the Cybernetic Culture Research Unit (CCRU) at Warwick University he brings together psychoanalysis, political analysis and speculative fiction to create a body of rogue scholarship. Fisher is the author of 'Capitalist Realism', the editor of 'The Resistible Demise of Michael Jackson' (both Zer0, 2009), and writes for Sight and Sound, Film Quarterly, The Wire and Frieze. He teaches at the University of East London, Goldsmiths, University of London, and the City Literary Institute.
